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SPECIALIZATION

My primary emphases are the Sociology of Immigration and Political Economy, focusing on the institutional and political underpinnings of human development. My current research focuses on the manner in which diaspora communities affect political and economic development outcomes at the local level in Guanajuato, Mexico. I am in the process of expanding this project to other states in central Mexico, including: Michoacán, Jalisco, and Zacatecas. This project was funded by the Fulbright foundation.

I have a secondary focus involving the social psychology of gender norms within different ethnic and racial groups. Specifically, I am currently exploring the manner in which males and females from different cultures cope with shame. In the fall of 2013 my co-authors and I surveyed more than 200 undergraduate students with the Compass of Shame Scale (CoSS). The results of our survey reveal strong shame-coping differences between Hispanics males/females and Anglo males/females.

FIELD WORK
