



SOCIOLOGY 201 (002/003): Sociological Imagination

Course Description and Objectives: The social world is often taken for granted or reduced to explanations that stem from conventional wisdom and personal experience. This course is designed to encourage students to develop analytical, social-scientific frameworks for analyzing the social world in a context that transcends conventional wisdom and personal experience. The major question driving this course is: "What are the social forces operating in the world, often beyond the control of individuals, that shape individual behaviors and societal changes?" Topics include culture, socialization, social and economic inequalities, social structure, organizational behavior, social groups, deviance, and social institutions (family, religion, education, and economy, etc.).

Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Students will be able to define basic social scientific concepts pertaining to life in society.
2. Students will be able to analyze the social world from different social scientific perspectives (functionalist, conflict, and interactionist).
3. Students will be able to identify the various social forces impacting society and social life.
4. Students shall be able to interpret social scientific data regarding human interactions, group processes, and societal trends.
5. Students will be able to describe the ways in which inequities by gender, race, and class impact our social world.
6. Student will develop effective writing skills.

MySocLab:

Students MUST purchase an access code for MySocLab (\$55.00). To purchase the code click on the following link (or copy and paste it into the browser of your choice):

Choose the option "Yes I have a course ID" and enter the following code **waddell13731** for Soc 201. Once the screen loads select "MySocLab" and press "next". After you enter the necessary information you will be prompted to pay for the MySocLab access code. You can either pay with a credit card or via Paypal. After your payment goes through you will gain access to MySocLab. At this point you can begin to explore the course. Throughout the semester you will be accountable for completing assignments that accompany class lecture and readings. Thus, the earlier you get to know the contents and tools of MySocLab the better. Once you have explored MySocLab a little click on the tab labeled "Student Resources" and select "MySocLibrary." On the upper left-hand side of your screen click on "author" and then search for C. Wright Mills. Once you have located Mills click on C. Wright Mills, "The Promise." This is your first reading assignment. Also, please note that this is how you will locate additional readings in MySocLab. Once you have read "The Promise" go back to "Student Resources" and click on "Core Concept Videos" and search for "Sociologists at Work." Watch the video. Additional videos assigned for the course will be located here as well.

Assignments/Exams:

Quizzes (20%): Four *unannounced* quizzes will be administered throughout the semester. Quizzes will address material covered in the previous two or three class periods plus the material assigned for that particular day.

Essay Assignment Part 1 (10%) and Part 2 (20%): Part of your grade will be determined based on your performance on a two-part essay assignment. The first part of the assignment is worth 10% of your final grade, while the second part of the assignment is worth 20%. Further details concerning these assignments are provided on the course website.

Midterm exam (20%): A midterm exam will be given midway through the semester. The exam consists of multiple choice and true/false questions. If you read, take the assigned quizzes and attend lecture you will be well prepared for the exam.

Final Presentation (20%): Toward the end of the semester students will give a group presentation in class. Presentations will be done in groups of three to four students. Additional information concerning this assignment is provided on the course website.

Final Exam (10%): Students will take a comprehensive final exam during finals week.

Written work: All written work must be typed, double-spaced, 12-point font (Garamond or Times New Roman preferred), with 1” margins on all sides. Papers *may not* be turned in via e-mail unless I request a digital copy. Late papers will be penalized with a 10 point deduction for each day after the deadline.

Extra Credit: For each essay, if you utilize the writing lab I will increase your final grade, for that particular assignment, by 5 percent (you will need to provide edited drafts with your final essay).
